Dear Good People of St. Mary,

I was on the phone the other day with a dear friend of mine who is an evangelical minister in the Chicago area, we were trying to put together details for some upcoming meetings. It was a Saturday afternoon and I told him I would email him the information shortly, as soon as I could get to it after confessions were over. He said, "That's fine. But just know that I won't respond to you until Monday morning. I shut my phone off for the Sabbath."

My reaction was, "You're kidding, right?" I mean, I didn't say it out loud to him, but I was thinking it.

As accustomed as we have tried to become to constant emailing and texting, I wonder the damage caused by the sheer volume of communication as a constant activity. But if we don't check in very regularly, the emails and messages pile up so quickly that we don't have time to catch up.

My friend isn't actively serving a congregation as a pastor at the present time, he attends a church, so he doesn't have the weekend demand. But still -- I don't think I could go off the grid for the Lord's Day.

I think of myself as one who has tried to keep limits on these things, to manage several hundred communications a day. I tried Facebook for about three months, only to learn that it filled my inbox with information that either wasn't necessary or simply not any of my business. I learned things about people and how they dealt with each other that I realized I'd just rather not know. As for all the "friends" and "friending" that was taking place, I found it a very cheap substitute for real relationship and, if we were honest, was more of an addiction for information, scanning, searching, consuming knowledge about other people and what is going on. It is a modern-day, infinite version of the one-column by five-inch article in the newspaper (old school) that we used to call the weekly "gossip column."

Back to my friend. The more I thought about it, I realized that we have allowed these hundreds-a-day invasions of time. We all know people who do little else all day long. One young adult I know counts among his very best friends those with whom he chats on line, people that he actually has never met in person. "Doesn't that trouble you?" I asked him. "Not at all," he replied. "Should it?"

Have you found yourself resenting the many demands which too easily can be made by anyone who types a sentence and hits "send"? Your response is expected. This "remote control" allows us to hold expectations for others with very little personal accountability for ourselves.

It also allows us to act inhumanly, even cruelly, without any responsibility, patricularly when we communicate anonymously. We learned a long time ago to never look at a public blog, some seem basically a license for hatred. One social media site popular with teens advertises itself as the place where you can "be anyone you want to be." It makes you wonder if the person on the other end of the ether is who they say they are, at all.

Some people have begun to refuse to use email or social media at all. "If you want to speak to me, or ask me something, you just need to call." There is a growing awareness that community cannot be established and nurtured through an unnatural, impersonal message (which is so often misunderstood, anyway).

Since community is built on relationships, these relationships need to be real, face-to-face, and multi-leveled. Our community is based on the quality of its communication. How are we doing? Are we losing the ability to communicate we once had? Will a new generation develop with a completely different, detached understanding of relationship?

There will never be a substitute for real-time encounter and sharing. Give somebody a call.

For those who have never taken Virtus Certification training as a part of our diocesan child protection program in parish ministry, we have



grow for your neighbor



In early May of this year, we were contacted by fellow parishioner, Mary Van Slyke, inviting our parish community to consider participating in the Grow for Your Neighbor Program. The opportunity is a perfect complement to our current food related outreach efforts—creative and promoting self-sufficiency, it encourages community service by giving back at the same time. Mary's passion to educate and promote healthy nutrition has evolved into a beautiful working relationship with local youth, business and community partners.

Grow for Your Neighbor is a community project that provides many families with fresh produce throughout the local growing season. It is an initiative to inform area residents of The Fredericksburg Area Food Bank's need for fresh food and encourage gardeners to donate a portion of their homegrown produce. Donating is conve-

nient, with a collection truck available weekly during the growing months at the Saturday Spotsylvania County Farmers Market on Route 3 West. Collections are made each Saturday with St. Mary collecting donations for distribution out to the community the 4th Saturday each month. To date 1,250 lbs. of fresh vegetables have been distributed to persons in need in the community.

The program is more than an opportunity to make a donation. It has made available affordable, 4x4 garden kits, with the purpose of encouraging involvement by those who may not have ever gardened. The projects have become a family effort; upon receiving the garden kit and supplies, the young gardeners pledge a portion of their garden bounty to the food bank.

Mary sees this project as having much potential and many applications for education, nature appreciation, healthy eating and service: "I've been

so pleased with the support of our community, as our local Riverbend High School students will be growing plants for garden kits and Bonnie Plants has donated 600+ vegetable plants."

Grow for Your Neighbor has partnered with Spotsylvania Education Foundation to get the word out to the families of our 31 county schools.

"We're fortunate to also have the support of The Square Foot Gardening Foundation, a non-profit organization whose mission is 'to teach self-sustainability and reliance through gardening. To promote a lifestyle that manages your health in a positive manner." The Foundation works installing gardens and teaching their gardening method worldwide so that people may feed themselves.

In our parish community, Mary has worked with parish youth to provide gardening kits for

Mary's Shelter so that the young women can learn the benefits of gardening and to demonstrate what might be possible—growing fresh produce for themselves and one another—and in time share back to the community. We also have been fortunate to have connected her with our local Catholic Charities Resettlement and Migration Office, where she has assisted in providing kits to our newcomers in much the same way—growing produce for themselves.

In many ways it is Mary's passion and response to God's call that has facilitated a traditionally common idea into something uncommonly good.

work camp 2014

Every summer St. Mary sends teens out to serve God's people. This year 52 teens and 17 adults participated in two WorkCamps: Shenandoah, VA and Oil City, PA.

Diocesan: Shenandoah, VA

This summer marks the 25th year that the Diocese of Arlington has sponsored their annual WorkCamp. In the last few years the Diocese of Arlington has brought together the largest number of teens to a WorkCamp in the entire United States. This year, there were well over 1,200 total participants at WorkCamp. The Diocesan WorkCamp typically spends 3-4 years in a particular area of the Diocese helping those in need and then moves to another area within the Diocese.

Catholic Heart: Oil City, PA

Catholic Heart WorkCamp (CHWC) was started in 1993 by two Youth Ministers in Florida. After 21 years CHWC has spread over the entire United States as well as Jamaica, Grenada and Belize. In the summer of 2013 CHWC had over 12,500 campers (just that summer alone) serving Gods people. Oil City, PA was a newly added city to CHWC list and a smaller camp of about 200 people participated. The need was very great. Oil City was once a prosperous oil town (hence the name), but soon after the oil wells closed many moved away and the city began to decay. In the last 20 years or so there has been an effort to revitalize the city and WorkCamp is joining in to help those in need.

What happens at WorkCamp?

Both camps are very similar in their work projects as well as evening program designed to take the work the teens have done and connect it to their faith. The week includes teens leaving behind their cellphones (to some thee most challenging thing), sleeping on floors, eating peanut butter and jelly sandwiches every day during







lunch, waiting in dinner lines for food and showers, and doing demanding physical work in the 90+ degree weather. During the week campers attend daily Mass, regular prayer, and devotions throughout the day. Eucharistic Adoration, Confessions, talks and reflections take place each evening along with fun activities such as music, dancing and on stage games put together by the WorkCamp staff.

During the mornings campers get up and head to Mass, breakfast and their worksite. Teens, led by adult crew leaders and contractors did projects such as painting, building wheelchair ramps, replacing roofs and windows, repairing bathroom showers and toilets, patching floors, and many other projects designed to help make the residents' homes warmer, safer, or drier.

This is not a typical week for many teens, but it is one that they fall in love with and are able to see God in themselves, their peers and the people they serve. One of our girls said, "The most difficult part was the work. I am not a physical-labor-type person and it was a bit hard. Seeing my resident's face after we finished the work was worth all of the discomfort."

Kevin Bohli, the Director for the Office of Youth Ministry for the Diocese of Arlington was recently quoted saying, "WorkCamp has helped teens serve the poor in our community. However, perhaps more importantly, it's through the service, prayer, and community of WorkCamp that young people discover the joy of living a life for Christ." It is that discovery that brings our young people back to St. Mary to continue to serve, and be the hands and feet of God in their own home."

This year youth will speak after Masses on the weekend of August 16-17 to thank the parish for their support and speak of their experiences.

Participation requires a commitment of one or two hours per month of service, per package of food ordered, in the parish or elsewhere. Any service given to someone else is acceptable. Distribution of packages takes place the fourth Saturday of the month from 8 to 9am.
