Dear Good People of Saint Mary,

Last week we gathered to honor volunteers, and to thank them for how they bring life to our parish community.

There is nothing so wonderful as a volunteer, or anyone, for that matter, who can represent Christ to others. Twelve years ago when I came to Saint Mary it seemed like we had forgotten how to volunteer. Or, more accurately, guess it could be said that volunteers had been hibernating because there had been no invitation to them, to make their gifts known and used for the good of all. There had been no Parish Council since 1976. Ministries were managed in very small doses, if they were there. We had prayer groups and Knights of Columbus, lectors and eucharistic ministers, but our presence in the community was nonexistent. I remember going to my first Micah meeting many years ago and asking why we weren't involved in outreach to the homeless, or refugees, or the hungry. I was told that the Catholic Church wasn't interested. Thank you for coming to dinner, the feast is prepared, we just need people to come and dine...

National Vocations Awareness Week, November 2-8

"National Vocation Awareness Week is an annual week-long celebration of the Catholic Church in the United States dedicated to promote vocations to the priesthood, diaconate and consecrated life through prayer and education, and to renew our prayers and support for those who are considering one of these particular vocations. This week is dedicated to building community awareness." http://www.usccb.org/beliefs-and-teachings/vocations/national-vocation-awareness-week.cfm

During Religious Education classes we will distribute prayer cards and pray the Vocations Prayer before and after classes.

"Pope Francis, in his November 2013 apostolic exhortation, *Evangelii Gaudium*, underlined the continued need to build a culture of vocations. "The fraternal life and fervor of the community can awaken in the young a desire to consecrate themselves completely to God and to preaching of the Gospel. This is particularly true if such a living community prays insistently for vocations and courageously proposes to its young people the path of special consecration," Pope Francis wrote.

"A culture of vocations is one that provides the necessary support for others to hear and respond to God's call in their lives," said Bishop Michael F. Burbidge of Raleigh, North Carolina, chairman of the U.S. bishops' Committee on Clergy, Consecrated Life and Vocations (CCLV). "With God's grace, we help build that culture through fervent prayer, the witness of our lives and the encouragement we extend to those discerning a vocation to priesthood or consecrated life."

A 2012 study, "Consideration of Priesthood and Religious Life Among Never-Married U.S. Catholics," conducted by the Georgetown Universitybased Center for Applied Research in the Apostolate (CARA), highlighted the role community encouragement plays in the discernment process.

"The number three seems to be critical in making a difference in the life of someone contemplating a vocation," said Fr. Shawn McKnight, USCCB's executive director of CCLV. "When three or more people encourage someone to consider a religious vocation, he or she is far more likely to take serious steps toward answering that call."

Father John Guthrie, associate director of CCLV, adds that National Vocation Awareness Week should also focus on communities that are underrepresented among religious vocations today, especially Hispanics.

"While numbers of U.S. Hispanics pursuing religious vocations are picking up, they still lag behind the overall demographic trends," said Father Guthrie. "Fifty-four percent of U.S. Catholics under the age of 25 are Hispanic, yet only 15 percent of students in major seminaries are Hispanic, and many of these were born in other countries. To reach this untapped potential, the Church must do far more to engage and support young people in these communities."

Observance of Vocation Awareness Week began in 1976 when the U.S. bishops designated the 28th Sunday of the year for the celebration. It was later moved to Feast of the Baptism of the Lord in January. Last year, after extensive consultation, the Committee on Clergy, Consecrated Life and Vocations moved the observance of National Vocation Awareness Week to November to engage Catholic schools and colleges more effectively in this effort. This will be the first year it will be held in November.

Political campaigns

It is a good time to review our diocesan policies regarding political activities on Church property. A more complete discussion of these policies is available online at VCC Political Activity Guidelines.

A few principles to keep in mind:

• Distribution of partisan campaign literature (e.g. leaflets, bumper stickers, etc.) on Church property is not permitted. If you discover someone engaging in such activity, politely ask them to stop and escort them off the property. If they will not comply with a polite request, the police (or sheriff) may be called to assist.

• Candidates for political office may not be endorsed or opposed, either at Mass or through any official Church channel.

• If one candidate in a particular race is invited to speak at a parish event, his or her opponent(s) should also be invited.

• Voter guides or election-related materials other than those prepared by Bishop Loverde, the Virginia Catholic Conference or the USCCB, may not be distributed.
