Dear Good People of Saint Mary,

This week I am glad to announce to you some of the ideas that our *Laudato si'* discussion group is ready to propose to the parish for consideration as a response to Pope Francis. You will find our ideas listed on pages 8-9 of today's bulletin.

You will notice that **one of the ways our parish** is seeking to grow our community into a place where people know each other and are known is by encouraging your family's inclusion in the **Parish Photo Directory.** People can feel welcome by getting to know who is sitting next to them in church. **I ask you to do it.** As it stands right now, only about 350 families will be represented (500 years from now they will think we are only a small parish)—the photographers are scheduled up to Thanksgiving with only 6% of appointments taken. I think we can add more if there is interest.

At the heart of the encyclical is not nature for nature's own sake. Nature is God's creation and we must honor it, but it was made by God for a particular purpose. Pope Francis says that God made the earth as the place where he intends to encounter mankind. To destroy the place is to destroy the meeting. Listen to what he says about how creation is made for the Eucharist:

"The sacraments are a privileged way in which nature is taken up by God to become a means of mediating supernatural life. Through our worship of God, we are invited to embrace the world on a different plane. Water, oil, fire and colors are taken up in all their symbolic power and incorporated in our act of praise. In the Eucharist, we find its greatest exaltation. God himself became man and gave himself as food for his creatures. The Lord choose to reach our intimate depths through a fragment of matter. He came not from above, but from within. [How absolutely beautiful is that thought?] The Eucharist joins heaven and earth. The Eucharist is a source of light and motivation for our concerns for the environment, directing us to be stewards of all creation" (233).

One of the women in our group wrote this:

"Reflecting, I came to realize that if we allowed God to do what he had intended, that is, if we allowed him to be in charge, things might kind of take care of themselves. For example, if you cut yourself, the body starts immediately to clot and stop the bleeding. The body is always repairing itself. As for nature: While I was waiting at the

light to turn into the supermarket, I noticed the "weeds" growing up out of the tons of cement. It was one of those "moments." To realize the power of God to have his creation growing up through tons of cement. That he is always trying to make things right, and we are preventing it. It made me sad to think just how much we have destroyed ..."

Another parishioner wrote this:

"Pope Francis has inspired me to see outside of political party alliances and focus on the teachings of the Church and everything you just said in your bulletin. After all these years I realized that neither political party truly represents the compassion of Christ or represents the sanctity of life from conception to natural death (fair wages, etc.) and I am moved by the Holy Spirit through the Pope to share this with the world. I look forward to learning how I can help our parish see through the political/financial controls that have consumed us as I also continue to grow. I know this is the truth although a hard one for many to open their eyes to. It takes true grace to question oneself and change."

I am so grateful for all who are willing to look around and see the world with new eyes. "All is gift" (St. Ignatius), and "all is grace" (Dorothy Day). Until we are able to see the beauty that is in a blade of grass we won't begin to understand the love of God. It is my conviction that our world doesn't care for our world today because they do not know the love of God staring at them from every blade of grass. And only then the tree that passes now from the green of ordinary time to the red of martyrdom, a dying that gives witness to the new life of resurrection at Eastertime. I would imagine the voice of God to be more beautiful than, or maybe the combination total of, every midnight and bird and poem and storm, Brahms' "Requiem" and sunrise, all in an instant.

Pope Francis puts it rather soberly:

We must regain the conviction that we need one another, that we have a shared responsibility for others and the world, and that being good and decent are worth it. We have had enough of immorality and the mockery of ethics, goodness, faith and honesty. It is time to acknowledge that light-hearted superficiality has done us no good. When the foundations of social life are corroded, what ensues are battles over conflicting interests, new forms of violence and brutality, and obstacles to the growth of a genuine culture of care for the environment (229).

saint mary responds

yes: laudato si'

A couple dozen parishioners met the last few Sundays to discuss the Holy Father's encyclical on Care for the Earth, Laudato si'. Pope Francis is very keen on results action—as a response to the needs of our day. His message is clear: we have to talk about the problem, we have to build relationships as brothers and sisters, and we have to do something about it.

Following is a first draft of our group's findings and suggestions of ways in which we might proceed. All of these are intended for our parish family at Saint Mary, but would be even more meaningful if our activities could cross lines of race and creed for all people to care for our common home.

Education

We plan to invite a speaker to the parish from the Friends of the Rappahannock to speak about things we can do that would be appropriate to our area, such as: preventing the use of fertilizers which flow from our lawns into the bay; what kind of plants are invaders that threaten native plants and use too much water, endangering other species; incorporation of raingardens.

At Saint Mary we are going to ask our garden committee to identify plants on the property with names, to acquaint people with native species and names of the plants that share our space.

Much of what Pope Francis writes about, also, is a reintroduction of ethics into our understanding of modern life. A speaker could give the moral considerations that should be heeded when creating a built environment that brings people together and provides a space where relationship can build society. What impact has our presence here had on others?

Find ways to support more effectively our local family services office and other agencies which support the family and build up the community.

Is there a way that the parish can be involved in creating safe, affordable housing? Can we be involved with the foster care program to help integrate young adults who transition into society?



The encyclical suggests any means that would make a community more accessible and help people to feel that they belong to immigrants and religious liberty, we hope to work on preparing a discussion about mental illness in our communities. Virginia is currently ranked 48th of 50 states for mental health care. Millions spent on care of plant species could also be used effectively if diverted to care of humans.

Personal Consumption

Reduce, Reuse, Recycle...

We discussed all kinds of practical things we could easily do as a response to change our use and throw-away mentality.

• When we recycle, we naturally use less. If we buy less, we throw away less. Members of our committee are going to research the most effective ways to promote recycling in our parish. But the bottom line is simply to use less. Mostly we waste because we don't think it through.

Would you consider *intentionally* rationing something that you use, limiting your consumption to a certain smaller amount? If we know the supply is limited, we are more careful with what we use. Our group is going to make suggestions about how we could practice voluntary rationing of some items. Our world simply is not an all-you-can-eat buffet.

- We are going to stop using styrofoam products in the parish.
- Collect the water you run while waiting for it to become hot, save it for other uses.
- Even though paper is recyclable, use only what you need. Dishtowels instead of paper towels; handkerchiefs for adults instead of tissue.
- If single streaming recycling is the practice of our local waste management contractors and city trash service, we need to start having special recycling containers in our parish buildings and our neighborhoods. Maybe our parishioners can start initiatives with their neighbors and friends, if such concern has not already brought about results.

Our Annual Giving Tree: Why so many gift cards?

Every year we have a Christmas tree in our Church filled with ornament tags that represent the various groups we serve through this ministry. When you look at some of the ornaments you will find things such as baby clothing or items for new mothers (Mary's Shelter or **Hope House**). Sometimes vou see things like lotion, bed sheets, slippers or clothing for Woodmont or Greenfield (nursing homes). In the last few years it has become more common to pick up tags that reguest a \$25, \$50, \$75 or \$100 gift card. There are many people who have asked us, "Why are agencies asking for gift cards instead of toys like they use to?" This is a great question and we want to explain.

Some of the agencies we work with have told us that as wonderful as it is for their families to receive lots of toys to give to their children on Christmas day, the reality is that toys don't fill bellies with food, or help get diapers, shampoo, or many other necessary things that families need. Many of these agencies who work directly with families—such as St. Vincent de Paul and Refugee Resettlement Services—have stopped asking for toys because the families they represent have asked them to. The gift cards can be used to pay for food, other necessary items, as well as a few toys for the kids. Likewise, Micah Ministries utilizes the gift cards we provide for the varied and extensive needs of the people

A new organization that we have on our Giving Tree this year is **Catholic Charities Family Services**. Catholic Charities Family Services provides counseling to people in our community including adults, children, families, couples and a few groups. They are able to serve clients on a sliding scale fee, taking into account annual income as well as the number of dependents in a family. Fees for sessions range from \$15-\$100 per session. By providing a check to Catholic Charities Family Services you are able to help families, individuals and couples who desperately need counseling and otherwise could not afford it.

We hope this helps to explain the reason why there are so many ornament tags requesting gift cards or checks. There are still many ornaments that have particular items that can be bought if giving a gift card doesn't seem personal enough for you. However, the reality is that these gift cards and checks allow these incredible organizations to go beyond making Christmas day a joyful memory. After the Christmas lights are put away and the New Year has passed, these gift cards and checks continue to provide much needed help.

SHARE looking for new distribution site

We learned last month that we will no longer have the use our current location for distribution of our SHARE Program to local participating churches. **The**

program currently serves 450+ families within a community of approximately 15 local churches from Bealeton to King George. Participants provide over 1,000 hours of community service each month.

If you are aware or can offer an alternate location within a ten mile radius of Saint Mary it would be **greatly appreciated.** The need is as follows: approximately 1,000 square feet, indoors preferable (to be out of the bad weather) but not absolutely necessary, access to a commercial loading dock and use from 6am-8:30am the third Saturday of each month. Pro-Life reflection for November 15

"Today, too, children are a sign. They are a sign of hope, a sign of life, but also a diagnostic sign, a marker indicating the health of families, society and the entire world. Wherever children are accepted, loved, cared for and protected, the family is healthy, society is better and the world is more human."

-Pope Francis, Homily during Holy Mass at Nativity Square in Bethlehem, May 2014
