HOLY CROSS ACADEMY

Dear Good People of Saint Mary,

As you know, school is started now at Holy Cross Academy and final preparations are underway by our parish staff to begin the year for Religious Education—on Monday, September 14, one week away.

Today I must remind all parents of your moral and sacramental obligation to provide formation for your children in the faith. As your pastor I must remind you of this commitment.

Registrations this year are only 74% of where we were at this time last year. So far, only 711 children are registered in the program beginning next week, down from 965 last year.

What has happened? I haven't heard of your dissatisfaction, in fact, only that our program has gotten better every year. Our dedicated catechists are always seeking more formation and certification, our facilities newly renovated. What has happened?

Karen Sturtevant, our Assistant Director of Religious Education, provided me with some figures for this year:

I include all of these here because they are startling. 40% of the children/youth in our parish are involved in a form of faith formation. 60% are not involved. At all.

I am hoping that the main reason for this is simply that school begins a week later this year and people are slow to get in and register, though registration has been underway since June.

National averages, however, seem to be trending in this direction. From 1965 to 2014, estimated Catholic population in this country has increased by 30 million, to about 80 million total. There are half as many Catholic elementary schools today as in 1966, and only a relatively small number fewer Catholic high schools and universities.

The number of primary school-age children in parish religious education programs has dropped from 3.4 million in 1965 to 2.7 million today (79%), though the number of Catholics today is 160% compared to 1965. Likewise, 43% of teens are registered in secondary school-age religious education today, .6 million compared to 1.4 million in 1965.

These effects are seen in sacraments received, too. The number of baptisms in 1965, 1.3 million, has dropped to .7 million today; marriages in the Catholic Church have dropped by 57%. Mass attendance in 1965, 55%, dropped to a low of 22% in the year 2000, and has returned to 24% today.

I believe that the most serious obligation we have as a parish community is to provide Catholic education and formation. I wish we could develop a culture where Catholic education could be provided to all who seek it through the support of the whole parish, but that is a dream that will require a lot of prayer and generosity that simply doesn't exist today. We provide financial assistance where possible, but Catholic schools remains a wish that most people cannot afford. Thanks to those of you who make the sacrifice.

Religious Education, then, is our next best hope. Why is it not demanded by parents of their children? Still, I hear from people every day who, now in their later years, wish they had done something different with their children that might have helped them hold on to their faith, stay in the Church, live by a better set of values, get into heaven. It requires a perspective of the future looking back, to see that these are not choices that children can make for themselves. If you have registered, thank you. If not, please, please, consider registering your children.

Registered parishioners, please enter your name in the raffle, if you wish, by September 9.

We learned this week that the Diocese of Arlington has received 325 tickets to the Mass. Each parish has two seats, and the standing room spaces are divided according to parish size. **Therefore, we are given 2 seats and 11 standing spaces.** Please read the details below before you decide whether or not you would like to enter your name in the raffle.

Registration for the raffle can be made by calling the parish office. Each registered parishioner can only enter the raffle one time. When entering, you may mention a spouse, parent or son or daughter that you would like to go with. If your name is called, consideration will be made as tickets may be awarded singly or in pairs.

Canonization Mass – General Information—The Canonization Mass will be celebrated outdoors at 4:15pm (tentative) on the East Portico of the Basilica, facing the University Mall at the Catholic University of America. The Mass will be primarily in the Spanish language, and is expected to exceed 2.5 hours in length, not including time before and after the Mass itself.

Those attending the Mass will need to arrive at Catholic University early, and will be there for six hours or more, not counting transportation time. This will be a strenuous day, particularly if weather conditions are not ideal. This may be of interest to parishioners who are elderly or infirm in deciding whether they wish to request tickets.

Due to the small venue and the necessary security, seating and standing room at the Mass will be very limited. Tickets will be required to attend Mass. Tickets may not be sold or transferred to others: each

ticket recipient must attend the Mass, or return it for reassignment.

Some tickets will be for seats, others will be for standing areas. Seats are not reserved, so those with tickets for a seat may wish to arrive really early to get a good spot. Some seats and some standing areas will have obstructed, or partially obstructed, views. However, large video screens will be available to help make the Mass visible to all those with tickets.

It is also good to note that the Mass will be broadcast live online at walk-withfrancis.org, in addition to live coverage of the Holy Father's entire visit to the US on EWTN television, and via live streaming at usccb.org. You will also be able to download the live streaming app usacatholic. church, available for Android and at iTunes.

Transportation—Transportation will be a challenge. There will be no parking at the Basilica, and all roads in the immediate vicinity will be closed. It is likely that all will be encouraged to use the Metro. The Brookland/CUA Station on the Red Line is less than one-half mile from the location of the Mass.

- Mass in the afternoon on the east portico of the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception and the University Mall at CUA. During the Mass, the pope will canonize Blessed Junipero Serra



Thursday, September 24

- Address joint meeting of the US Congress in the morning
- Visit St. Patrick's Church in DC and meet with several clients of Catholic Charities late morning
- Blessing and brief remarks to the clients at lunchtime for the St. Maria Meals Program of DC Catholic Charities
- Depart for NYC from Andrews Air Force Base.

There may be opportunities to see Pope Francis as he travels between events. Information will be made available on the Archdiocese of Washington's website, www.adw. org as plans are finalized. Parishioners may text PopeinDC to 84576 to receive text alerts.



Our Committee has met twice and are ready to assist event planners and provide a Catholic presence at the upcoming Hope Over Heroin event, Friday and Saturday evenings, September 25 and 26, from 7 to 9pm.

The event is intended to let people who are trapped in the addiction to heroin know that there is a community here who

supports them. "We can't not be there," said Fr. Don, "because people need to be constantly reminded of their dignity and value, and that we are here as a loving community to walk with people who suffer." Many people who have an addict in the family – and this number is quickly growing larger and larger – don't know where to

turn. It is scary to talk about it. But if we just speak of it in our parish family and bring it into the light of day, that is the first step toward healing. We need to let them and their families know that we are here before, during and after, and that our love and mercy is unconditional as we walk together seeking healing and recovery.

Saint Mary and Catholic Charities will each have a tent at the event, a witness to our presence and concern for this epidemic which threatens our community like no drug ever has before. We will be there to provide listening, resources, cookies and prayers. We hope that a group will grow out of this experience to help our community grow in awareness and support of people who suffer addiction, particularly in this difficult battle with heroin.

Here is what we would like you to do as a parish: 1) Pray! 2) **Bake!** Let us know in the office if you can deliver some delicious snacks to the office on Friday the 25th that we can offer at our tents. 3) Donate a book. If there is a particular book or two that you have found helpful or inspirational, pass it on. If you have any recovery or twelve-step related books that you would like to give to someone who really needs it, please bring it into the parish office, too. Please, these books only: not an opportunity to clean out your shelves! We will distribute these books at our tents both evenings.

Most of all, if you know of someone who is alone and trapped in heroin addiction, let them know we care and there are ways that we can help them seek solutions and wholeness. For most, knowing that you are not alone is the first step to recovery.


