The concelebrated Mass of the Lord's Supper commemorates the institution of the Eucharist and the Priesthood by Jesus at the Last Supper. The commandment of love is symbolized by the Mandatum, or footwashing, where Jesus teaches, "As I have done, so must you also do." Parishioners are encouraged to join in the ancient procession of the Blessed Sacrament to its place of repose in the Parish Life Center, where adoration will continue until midnight as we accompany Jesus in his agony in the Garden of Gethsemane.

"Tre Ore," The Seven Last Words

Although not a part of the formal observance of the Sacred Triduum Rites as such, this is a traditional custom of many churches. The seven last words of Jesus as he is crucified on the cross are presented every 25 minutes, each with a congregational hymn and choral selections. Clergy will give a reflection for each of the words of Jesus and the Three Hours will conclude with the public praying of the Stations of the Cross.

3:00pm

The Passion and Veneration of the Holy Cross (English)

We assemble in observance of Christ's saving death, by reading the narrative of his Passion, praying for the Universal Church, venerating his Cross in this ancient Rite and receiving Holy Communion which was consecrated on the previous evening at the Mass of the Lord's Supper.

The Good Friday collection assists the maintenance of the Shrines in the Holy Land.

Dear Folks,

Having just celebrated Ash Wednesday, I was reminded that it is pretty much the only day of the year I think about ashes.

Did you know that soap can be made from ash? I didn't. I only know that you buy it at WalMart.

But Wood Ash, with water and some oil can be combined to make soap. What seems dead, dry and exhausted of all energy, now gives one more time to cleanse and renew!

And did you know that ash can be used in compost to enrich the fertilizer? Wood having given its whole life to warm and illuminate, but even beyond the ash helps nourish and bring forth new life.

And did you know that ash can also help gardeners keep insects away when sprinkled around the perimeter? Worms, slugs and snails are deterred by the dry ash protecting the plant life growing in the garden.

And did you know that ash can be used to polish tarnished metals when combined with water? It can bring shine and beauty to that which is worn, tired, and dull.

Ash: in Soap in cleanses, in compost it nourishes, in gardens it protects against pests, it cupboards it restores shine, AND on Ash Wednesday it marks our repentance and desire to return to Christ. That repentance, by the grace of Christ pouring out His life on the wood of the cross: nourishes you, protects you, shines your soul, and cleanses you.

What appears to be useless is useful in so many ways. I had no idea. I guess folks who were more connected with making their own soap/compost/polish/ insecticide in the 2000 years prior to the invention of WalMart might have better known this. No wonder folks have used ashes for millennia as a sign of repentance and renewal. And now my understanding of the riches of this liturgical gesture? Boom!

What is the HCA SCRIP Program?

Holy Cross Academy has a program that provides a wonderful way to provide some financial support for Holy Cross Academy. Even if you do not have children who attend Holy Cross Academy, the SCRIP program provides financial support that goes directly to Holy Cross Academy for such costs as assistance for books, uniforms, and supplies, especially for families who need assistance

This is how it works. Most of us shop at various local vendors that are supported through SCRIP. These include Giant, Weis, Wawa, Starbucks, Wal-Mart, Target and some very popular area restaurants such as Olive Garden, Red Lobster, IHOP and Outback. There is a complete list at the following website **shopwithscrip.com**

There are several ways you can order/purchase gift cards through the SCRIP program. One is to visit a SCRIP table after most Masses (including HCA). There is a volunteer who will provide you information and help you purchase gifts cards. Checks or cash are

accepted. You can also go online and order gift cards for delivery to either HCA (after 10:30 Mass or during school hours when school is in session) or for pickup after Saturday or Sunday Masses at the Church. And for a way that is most convenient, set up a PayPal account and order gift cards on line for receipt through email. You will need St. Mary's enrollment code to set an account up at **shopwithscrip.com** but it easy to do. For the enrollment code or assistance, please contact the Scrip Coordinator at **scripcoordinator**@ **holycrossweb.com** or call 540-369-8354 (text okay as well). The Scrip Coordinator will walk you through the process and get you started.

Another advantage to using Scrip is you can prevent scammers from accessing your bank account. When you shop at Target, Walmart or at the gas pump, by using a scrip card instead of your bank card, scammers cannot gain access to your bank account information and thereby access your bank account. The funds are limited to the amount of the Scrip gift card only. Your bank account is safe.







Pope Clement - Office of Reading for Ash Wednesday

From a letter to the Corinthians by Saint Clement I, Pope and Martyr

Repent

Let us fix our attention on the blood of Christ and recognize how precious it is to God his Father, since it was shed for our salvation and brought the grace of repentance to all the world.

If we review the various ages of history, we will see that in every generation the Lord has offered the opportunity of repentance to any who were willing to turn to him. When Noah preached God's message of repentance, all who listened to him were saved. Jonah told the Ninevites they were going to be destroyed, but when they repented, their prayers gained God's forgiveness for their sins, and they were saved, even though they were not of God's people.

Under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, the ministers of God's grace have spoken of repentance; indeed, the Master of the whole universe himself spoke of repentance with an oath: As I live, says the Lord, I do not wish the death of the sinner but his repentance. He added this evidence of his goodness: House of Israel, repent of your wickedness. Tell the sons of my people: If their sins should reach from earth to heaven, if they are brighter than scarlet and blacker than sackcloth, you need only turn to me with your whole heart and say, "Father", and I will listen to you as a holy people.

In other words, God wanted all his beloved ones to have the opportunity to repent and he confirmed this desire by his own almighty will. That is why we should obey his sovereign and glorious will and prayerfully entreat his mercy and kindness.

We should be suppliant before him and turn to his compassion, rejecting empty works and quarreling and jealousy which only lead to death.

Brothers, we should be humble in mind, putting aside all arrogance, pride and foolish anger. Rather, we should act in accordance with the Scriptures, as the Holy Spirit says: The wise man must not glory in his wisdom nor the strong man in his strength nor the rich man in his riches. Rather, let him who glories glory in the Lord by seeking him and doing what is right and just. Recall especially what the Lord Jesus said when he taught gentleness and forbearance. Be merciful, he said, so that you may have mercy shown to you. Forgive, so that you may be forgiven. As you treat others, so you will be treated. As you give, so you will receive. As you judge, so you will be judged. As you are kind to others, so you will be treated kindly. The measure of your giving will be the measure of your receiving.

Let these commandments and precepts strengthen us to live in humble obedience to his sacred words. As Scripture asks: Whom shall I look upon with favor except the humble, peaceful man who trembles at my words?

Sharing then in the heritage of so many vast and glorious achievements, let us hasten toward the goal of peace, set before us from the beginning. Let us keep our eyes firmly fixed on the Father and Creator of the whole universe, and hold fast to his splendid and transcendent gifts of peace and all his blessings.
